In addition to Canadian broadcasts (Knowledge, Global, TVO) her films have been shown in Australia, The Netherlands, Poland, Sweden, Finland, Israel and Norway.

Shoot the Write Stuff



OPENING GALA FILM

My Internship in Canada / Guibord s'en va-t-en guerre

Friday • February 5 • 7:00pm • Odeon 5

Director: Philippe Falardeau • Quebec • 2015 • 108min

A smart comedy that will have Canadians smiling from ear to ear. Whether in *The Good Lie* or *Monsieur Lazhar*, director Falardeau is taken with topics that speak to strangers in a strange land. In *My Internship in Canada* we delight in a Haitian intern (Irdens Exantus) navigating his way through the opportunistic world of Canadian politics alongside MP and former hockey player Steve Guibord (Patrick Huard) as he traverses his huge riding and becomes the deciding vote in a move to declare war. With a background in Canadian politics and international relations it's no wonder that Falardeau deals with such timely topics.

Ex-star du hockey, Steve Guibord est désormais une personnalité politique de Prescott-Makadena, à Rapides-aux-Outardes, un comté en proie à d'importants conflits sociaux et à des guerres politiques opportunistes. The Victoria Film Festival is your best opportunity to experience the Canadian panorama on the big screen. Just like Canadians, each film we show has a story behind its story. If you're looking for somewhere to start, let us suggest a few of our most established voices.

Into the Forest is not just another wonderful performance by unabashedly Canadian Ellen Page. It's director Patricia Rozema's return to the kind of un-clichéd female-led dramas she excels so well at, which we've been missing since Mansfield Park and I've Heard the Mermaids Singing.

Speaking of Canadian auteurs, Mina Shum (whose very first short *Me, Mom and Mona* played at the very first VFF) is also back on the big screen with the documentary *Ninth Floor*. Culture remains an important aspect of her work but this time it's all about culture clash and racial divide rather than home and harmony.

Independent director extraordinaire Larry Weinstein is on another evocative and absorbing trip once again with *The Devil's Horn*. Audiences fell in love with 2009's *Inside Hana's Suitcase* and 2013's *Our Man in Tehran* at VFF. For 2016, *The Devil's Horn* is a wonderful saxophonic addition to his litany of musical docs that strives to answer 'Where does the music come from?'

After the Last River

Saturday • Feb 13 • 2:00pm • The Vic Theatre

Director: Victoria Lean • Ontario • 2015 • 87min • Documentary

In Attawapiskat, the arrival of the De Beers open pit diamond mine had long been touted as the best chance for local development. However, instead of improvements, we learned of the Attawapiskat First Nations crisis in Northern Ontario after a Red Cross intervention in 2011. Involving many voices such as local activist Rosie Koostachin, Attawapiskat Chief Theresa Spence, and even her own eco-toxicologist father, Victoria Lean's debut feature film lays out five years of this ongoing humanitarian crisis perpetrated by De Beers and the Harper government.



Al Purdy Was Here

Sunday • Feb 7 • 9:15pm • Odeon 2

Director: Brian D. Johnson • Ontario • 2015 • 90min • Documentary

Fifteen years after the death of one of Canada's iconic poets, director Johnson celebrates the life of Al Purdy and his impact on a young generation of Canadian poets, writers and singers. As a man of much complexity, Purdy was a rock star and raconteur who did not hold back or censor himself and approached poetry with his heart. Through a compilation of interviews with friends and fans (including some of Canada's best talent, including Margaret Atwood, Joseph Boyden and Sarah Harmer), you see into his life over his extensive career.



Dan and Margot • World Premiere Saturday • Feb 6 • 2:00pm • Odeon 1 Director: Chloe Sosa-Sims & Jake Chirico Ontario • 2014 • 75min • Documentary

For years, Margot was stalked and harassed by a man she could only call "Dan" and her friends began to notice the joyful Margot grow dark and less coherent. Only with hospitalization did the real damage of her undiagnosed schizophrenia suddenly come into sharp focus. Now Margot is rebuilding her life, reaching out to others, and trying to regain her sense of self. Our understanding of schizophrenia may have come a long way but *Dan and Margot* skillfully presents how much more we need to understand what it means to be inside it, to live around it and to come back from it.



The Devil's Horn

Director: Larry Weinstein • Ontario • 2015 • 85min • Documentary

VFF favourite and director of *Inside Hana's Suitcase, Mozartballs, Our Man in Tehran*, and *Stormy Weather:* The Music of Howard Arlen, Larry Weinstein returns with his latest documentary which explores the history of the saxophone and the fate of many of history's greatest players. Weinstein explores the origins of Adolphe Sax (the creator of the saxophone) 150 years ago and the role the sax played over time and borders. Learn more about the genesis of The Devil's Horn through Larry's In Conversation With session (see pg 73).

Director: Connor Gaston • Victoria • 2015 • 102min

Victorian Connor Gaston isn't new to the film circuit, with many of his shorts travelling to global film festivals, including Cannes. *The Devout* is Gaston's first feature length film and explores religious beliefs and reincarnation. Jan and Darryl are coping with the diagnosis of their terminally ill four-year-old daughter Abigail. When Abigail starts talking about a fire onboard the fatal Apollo 1 mission, Darryl starts to believe that she's talking about a past life. In a small, close-knit religious community, his questions start to divide him, his wife and his friends, during an already emotionally charged and tragic time.



Grubstake Remix

From the age of silent film comes Victoriaborn cinema legend Nell Shipman's 1923 The Grubstake, re-imagined. The Remix is a capture of a touring event that mixed Shipman's film with live music and quips from Shakespeare. Filled with Nell's trademarks — backwoods adventure, a strong, determined woman and a litany of melodramatic heavies and heels — it's the story of a woman who goes to Northern Canada to settle down, only to find out she's been betrayed. Comedy, romance and adventure in the Klondike!



He Hated Pigeons

Tuesday • Feb 9 • 8:45pm • The Vic

Director: Ingrid Veninger Ontario • 2015 • 80min

Elias made a promise to his lover to go to Chile one day; a promise that would take him as close to the ends of the Earth as roads allow. Presented at VFF with an improvised musical score from local band Morning Show, He Hated Pigeons is a story that speaks to the very beautiful and ethereal nature of human love. Director Veninger has long been Canada's DIY film queen, making small intimate movies on micro-budgets about the landscapes of our inner lives. Here, she moves that sensibility to a grander and more lovely scale than ever before.



Into the Forest

Director: Patricia Rozema • BC • 2015 • 101min

Nell (Ellen Page), Eva (Evan Rachel Wood) and their widowed father (Callum Keith Rennie) have survived a series of blackouts before, but when the latest one appears permanent, they're forced to figure out how to sustain and protect themselves. Well-stocked and living a few miles from civilization gives the family a jump on disaster preparedness, but the film makes it clear that they're just as dependent on modern conveniences as anyone else. The two women convey their desire for normalcy by maintaining routines to avert falling into despair as they're forced to disconnect and improvise but still prepare for the unknown. Based on Jean Hegland's book, critically-acclaimed director Rozema avoids the mainstream fire and brimstone and shows intimate moments and real emotion between two sisters trying to survive.



Lost and Found

Japan's record-breaking 2011 earthquake and tsunami hit over 90 cities and took over 18,000 lives on Japan's northeast coast. It also displaced over a million tons of debris but that hardly seemed to matter at the time. Within a year, that debris began showing up in the Pacific Northwest. However this time, beachcombers knew where these floating foreign oddities came from and what had been lost. This is the story of the folks in Canada and the US who've made it their mission to reunite these items with their original owners and reflect on not only what was lost but what can be regained.


Quebec • 2015 • 82min • Documentary In February 1968, six Caribbean students filed a grievance against their biology professor, alleging he was systematically giving them lower grades than their white peers for identical lab work. The university's stunning inadequacy dealing with the matter led to peaceful occupation of the Hall Building's ninth floor. Days later, Montreal's riot police stormed in, arresting and beating the protestors. In her first documentary, Shum (Double Happiness) paints a horrifying portrait of systemic racism - a conspiratorial thriller and exposé in one. Contextualizing the racism against the Montreal Expo '67 that promised a new age of diversity and multiculturalism, Shum has created an insightful, must-see film.



O Brazen Age

From the producer of VFF 2015's *The Valley Below* and The North Country Cinema Collective comes this unusual tale of art and myth in the 21st century. In Quebec, two twenty-something backroad travelers cross paths with a modern day Virgin Mary running away from the convent. Drifting on to Toronto to their spiritually distressed artistic friends, they discover comfort is not easy to come by. Carson's script is heavy on literary influence, but he is, without a doubt, a filmmaker with strong visionary interests.





The Roots Remain

Director: Jean-Sebastien Francoeur, Andrew Marchand-Boddy

In this telling memorial to the Cambodian genocide, Canadian-raised graffiti artist Fonki returns to Cambodia to paint murals commemorating his family and others lost to the Khmer Rouge regime. Fonki connects with other members of the Cambodian art and hip hop scene, many with families like Fonki's who fled during the regime. With original footage from the Pol Pot period combined with footage of Fonki creating his multiple murals around Cambodia, this beautiful documentary allows you to see graffiti as more than scribbles on the wall.



The Sandwich Nazi

Director: Lewis Bennett British Columbia • 2015 • 72min

Salam Kahil is a filthy-mouthed Surrey deli owner with a big heart as local first time feature film-maker Lewis Bennett reveals in this comedic look that was a hit at the Vancouver Film Fest. Larger than life, Salam is one of those classic characters creating a life on their own terms. Between acts of charity and vulgarity, he reveals bits of his eye-opening personal history that began in Lebanon and ends with making the "Best Sandwiches in North America". Bennett creates a complicated portrait of a true eccentric.



The Smalls: Forever is a Long Time

Director: Trevor Smith Alberta • 2015 • 103min

Documentary

In the 1990s, The Smalls were Alberta's best and brightest unruly mixture of John Deere hats, work boots, punk, metal, country and jazz, and to know them was to love them. Now, 13 years after their Goodbye Forever tour, the band is back together one more time and it's beautiful. Filmmaker Trevor Smith has done an exemplary job of mixing live show footage with intimate storytelling and art in a way that will both intrigue old fans and entice new ones.



The Steps

Family is a fickle thing. When Jeff (Jason Ritter) and Marla (Emmanuelle Chriqui) receive an invitation from their dad (James Brolin) to spend the weekend with his new wife and her kids, they are hesitant but need a chance to escape the city. What follows is a clashing between the two families, a drink-infused weekend, an arrest, and all-out war in this broad comedy. Director Currie (Fido, Mile Zero) delves back into the intricacies of family behaviour with his usual mix of insight and humour.



Tricks on the Dead

Documentary

In 1916, hoping to secure a seat at the world table, China agreed to give the Allied forces 140,000 peasant workers to help turn the tide against Germany. Thousands died. Almost all were forgotten. Almost, that is, until nearly a century later when a student named Zhang Yan undertook an epic journey of discovery, lead almost entirely from the diary of a wartime interpreter. His amazing voyage highlights not only the incredible scope of this lost chapter of WWI and Canada's surprising complicity in it but also, through gorgeous recreations, the life and times of all those who lived and died in those muddy trenches.



When Elephants Were Young • Hometown Premiere

This documentary by local director Patricia Sims, narrated by William Shatner, explores peoples' relationship with elephants in Thailand. Nong Mai has been in the family for a decade and the opportunity arises to release her into the wild, but the question becomes: can you afford to release your elephant when your family relies on it? watches over him from a distance, while keeping a chaotic emergency room running. At Ville-Marie Hospital, these four lives will collide and change forever.

INDIGENOUS PROGRAM

Presented by Michelle Latimer

I hope you enjoy the Victoria Film Festival's second annual spotlight on contemporary Indigenous cinema. All five of these films are directed by First Nations, Inuit or Métis artists, and speak to a new wave of filmmakers who are expressing their stories from the inside out. Raw, honest, and unapologetic, this work exemplifies an undeniable resurgence happening within global Indigenous cinema.

This year's selections include two exciting feature film debuts by directors Adam Garnet-Jones (Cree/Métis) and Sonia Boileau (Mohawk), as well as a powerful documentary by Nahuatl (Mexico) artist Omar Osiris Ponce Nava. Hot off the heels from premiering at Toronto International Film Festival, award-winning film-maker Sterlin Harjo (Seminole/Muscogee) brings us his gritty drama *Mekko*, while masterful Inuk director Zacharias Kunuk (*Atanarjuat: The Fast Runner*) celebrates language and history in his new, heart-wrenching documentary chronicling a group of Elders returning to their homelands.

While each of these films embodies a spirit unique unto itself, a central theme binds them together: all circle around loss, relocation and/or displacement.

We live in an era when Indigenous people all over the world are asserting land stewardship in the face of increasing corporate encroachment. It is no coincidence that the films presented here articulate what it means to have a fundamental connection to land and the personal consequences experienced when those ties are threatened.

Angirattut

Relocated some 50 years before, a group of Inuit Elders and their families return once again to their birthplace home sites. Told entirely in Inuktitut without the help of English subtitles, filmmaker Zacharias Kunuk (Atanarjuat: The Fast Runner) deeply immerses his audience in the captivating, rugged, and starkly beautiful world of his people, the Inuit. Emotional and uplifting, Kunuk expertly crafts a poetic tale that is both a celebration of Indigenous culture and a painful remembrance of the past. Angirattut exemplifies the power of language and oral tradition while honouring the ancestral ties that have anchored generations.



Fire Song

Tuesday • February 9 • 6:00pm • The Vic Theatre
Director: Adam Garnet Jones • Ontario • 2015 • 96min

Struggling to come to terms with his sister's recent suicide, Shane, a young, two-spirited Anishinaabe man, tries to figure out what to do with the rest of his life. Longing to get out of his First Nations community, Shane dreams of a new life in Toronto where he can go to school and also be free to express his true nature. However, with a despondent mother who's still unable to cope with the loss of her daughter, and poverty that seem to leak from the very roof under which Shane and his family live, the odds are stacked against him. Shane's spirit continues to be torn by two loves and his hunt for acceptance. In a moment of anguish, Shane explains that nothing will ever change unless Shane can finally accept who he really is. Evocative and hard-hitting, Jones' feature directorial debut *Fire Song* asks brave guestions while tackling issues that face many of our country's First Nations communities.



Le Dep

When her co-worker fails to show up for her shift at Le Dep (the family-run convenience store), young Innu woman Lydia agrees to stay on until closing at the request of her father, Serge. As a consequence, Serge entrusts his daughter with \$50,000 and the task of prepping envelopes in exchange for customers' welfare cheques the following day. The night goes smoothly until a masked intruder enters the store just as Lydia is about to close, demanding money and setting the stage for a claustrophobic psychological thriller. All contained within the confines of the convenience store, the action in *Le Dep* plays out like an intense one-act play, complete with suspense, drama and shocking character revelation. Most clever, though, is filmmaker Sonia Bonspille Boileau's ability to underscore the very important social issues of addiction, violence and child neglect in the midst of the action.



Mekko • British Columbia Premiere

Director: Sterlin Harjo • USA • 2015 • 87min

Newly released from a 19-year prison term, a Muscogee man, Mekko, returns to the gritty streets of Tulsa in an effort to reclaim the remnants of his broken life. However, once there, he realizes that time has not eased his family's resentments, and he finds himself living amongst the poor and the homeless. Burdened by addiction and regret, Mekko finds comfort in an old friend, Bunnie, and in the generosity of a young waitress at a diner he often frequents. Yet the darkness is never far behind, as one night Mekko and Bunnie are viciously attacked by a local thug. Mekko is reminded of the stories his grandmother used to tell, offering him a possible solution towards deliverance. Stark and violently realistic, Sterlin Harjo's *Mekko* mixes Indigenous legend with the contemporary, providing a truthful glimpse into one lost man's rediscovery.



Stories of the Sierra Madre / Historias de la Sierra Madre

For these deeply spiritual people, such an intrusion on their traditional waters and sacred lands would mean a certain end to their culture and their way of life. Sensitive, majestic, and poignantly told, Historias De La Sierra Madre seeks to show the magnificence of the natural world as well as the fine balance that exists between Mother Earth and its people.

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
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WORLD PERSPECTIVE

The story of this cursed monastery moves from the 17th century to modern times and touches upon the undead and the punishment for women the church needs to believe are evil. Whether knowingly or not, Bellocchio deals with themes that build a treatise for his switch from being raised a strict Catholic yet choosing atheism. Master filmmaker Bellocchio retains the ability to surprise that we've seen in his earlier works.

Director Lanthimos continues to tell dark, deadpan, existential stories and one can see hints of Bunuel and Renoir at their most surreal.

Backstage there exists exhilaration, stress, and the thrill of realized dreams. Prandstraller and Bruna capture a balance between life on stage and behind; a visual feast for the eyes and an opera lover's delight.

Three years before September 11th, Taliban militia seized the northern Afghanistan city of Mazar-e Sharif in a swift attack and wrought a horrible massacre upon its innocent civilians. Based upon the true story of the Iranian diplomats who were there at the time, *Mazar-e Sharif* reconstructs the chaos of those hours from the point of view of the lone survivor in the embassy. Part political thriller and part human tragedy, this film resounds with a depth and intensity not seen since *The Killing Fields*.

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



Lead actor and comedian Gunnar Jónsson in particular brings a layered humanity and deadpan humour to our hero.

It is an adulterer's dream to have an adoring, maternal, lifelong companion and a happy, commitment-free nubile young woman just across town. Watching Pierre one can feel his need and rationalization of the affair. Director Garrel, working in the Nouvelle Vague style as he has for almost 30 films, shoots in high contrast black and white on streets with a verité sensibility.





Nell (Ellen Page), Eva (Evan Rachel Wood) and their widowed father (Callum Keith Rennie) have survived a series of blackouts before, but when the latest one appears permanent, they're forced to figure out how to sustain and protect themselves. Well-stocked and living a few miles from civilization gives the family a jump on disaster preparedness, but the film makes it clear that they're just as dependent on modern conveniences as anyone else. The two women convey their desire for normalcy by maintaining routines to avert falling into despair as they're forced to disconnect and improvise but still prepare for the unknown. Based on Jean Hegland's book, critically-acclaimed director Rozema avoids the mainstream fire and brimstone and shows intimate moments and real emotion between two sisters trying to survive.

The young lovers elope, with enraged warriors following in pursuit. Both sides question their traditions in this rare film that explores their lives without patronizing them.

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
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
